## **JOU 4341 – SENIOR MULTIMEDIA PROJECT – SUMMER B 2017 • 3 UNITS**

### **CATALOG DESCRIPTION**

Conceptualizing and production of an online publication, including layout, photography, streaming video and audio. The project to be delivered in 3 different formats – print, television and on-line.

### **PURPOSE**

Students will be building a website – a sub-URL of SFNS.online – from the ground up. They will work as editors, producers, photographers, videographers and social media managers. As this is one of the final classes taken at FIU – if not the actual last class – it will test what you have learned during your collegiate career.

I will be treating this like a newsroom – and you as professionals. This means I will be giving you wide latitude inside and outside of class to complete your assignments. As such, this means I am only concerned about three things: That you make deadline, that your pieces are of the highest quality and that you conduct yourself in a professional and ethical manner.

### **OBJECTIVES**

During your career at FIU, you have amassed a great deal of practical and theoretical knowledge, from building a website to the history of journalism to effective interviewing techniques. However, one of the missing components is understanding how to find and use public records. This course is an attempt to bridge that gap.

By the end of this course, students will have produced a website that will provide a primer for the gathering and use of public records on the local, state and federal level. The intent is to have the site live on past the end of this course and be a resource for FIU students and the general public.

### **METHOD & COURSE STRUCTURE**

We will be running this course like a newsroom. Though I will be functioning as editor, some students in the class will serve in management roles. This will include a managing editor, city editor, video/photo editor as well as a web/copy editor.

All other students will be working in pairs as videographers, photographers and reporters. During the course of this short, six-week semester, these students will be tasked with producing two complete reports on a public record topic that includes a text explainer piece. In addition, these pieces must have one of the following elements:

- Video piece (no more than two minutes)
- Photo essay (seven to 15 images)
- Audio piece (no more than five minutes)
- Web visualization (e.g., infogr.am or similar)
- Interactive (e.g., Storymap, JS Timeline, etc.)

Editors will be responsible for: enforcing deadlines, ensuring quality (including making sure all piece requirements have been met) as well as copyediting the site for grammatical and AP errors. In addition, editors will collectively be responsible for:

- Designing the website to provided specifications
- Writing the introductory/overarching explainer materials
- Filling out the “About Us” section
- Posting to the SFNS Facebook, Twitter and Instagram account

### **ASSESSMENT & GRADING STRUCTURE**

Everyone in the class will receive the same grade for the two projects, based on my assessment of the overall quality, usefulness and adherence to the project requirements.

I also will be giving a grade to each team – as well as the editors individually – based on my assessment of these teams’ efforts.

The third aspect of the assessment will be a peer review. Following each project, each student will fill out an assessment of everyone they worked with. This includes team members and editors. As this is part of your grade, I expect you to be honest with one another. If someone has been shirking their work, this is where you let me know.

In addition, I reserve the right to adjust an individual student’s grade upward – or downward – based on effort, attitude and overall fairness. For instance, if a student’s grade has suffered because of an inattentive or indifferent teammate, I would bump up the grade of that person and lower the grade of the slacker teammate.

Finally, as this is the senior capstone, our work will be reviewed by journalism professors and professionals. It is in your best interest, both academically and professionally to do your best. This can be a website you can attach to your resumes and may very well give you a leg up in the job market.

## **REQUIRED TEXTS & COURSE COSTS**

You must have access to the **AP Stylebook** at all time, whether in class or outside. You can purchase the bound edition or get the smartphone app. Either are fine.

In addition, please note that not all public records are free. This means you may have to spend some money in order to get your desired materials, and should expect to have to do so. However, your costs will be limited to \$50 for the semester.

## **GRADING CRITERIA**

Traditional grades and grade point averages are assigned as follows:

**“A” (90-100%)** pieces are accurate, clear, comprehensive stories that are well written and require only minor editing.

**“B” (80-89%)** pieces require more than minor editing, and have a few style or minor spelling errors or an error of omission.

**“C” (70-79%)** pieces need considerable editing or rewriting and/or have many minor spelling and style errors.

**“D” (60-69%)** pieces require excessive editing or rewriting; have numerous minor spelling and style errors, and should not have been submitted.

**“F” (0-59%)** pieces that have all of the above problems, have missed deadline, at least one proper name misspelled, and/or one factual error.

*The final course grade will use percentages as above, with the addition of high/low letter grades (e.g. A-; B+; C, etc.). Ask if you would like specific percentage data. Please note that CARTA no longer awards grades of C-, D+ or D-.*

Your copy should not contain any errors in spelling, style, grammar and facts. There should not be any omissions, either. In fact, any misspelled proper noun (even if it's due to a typographical error) or any inaccuracy will result in a full-grade markdown. A factual error will also result in a full-grade markdown.

Accuracy is the first law of journalism. Professional journalists are expected to get their facts right, to spell and punctuate correctly, and to respect grammar and syntax. In case of doubt, check your facts, consult the AP Stylebook or a dictionary. It only takes a minute or two to avoid mistakes.

Typing skills are essential in this course. You must be able to use a computer, type fast, and use Word. When working on a computer, save often, make a back-up copy of your work, and print it out at various stages of the writing process. Always keep a

hard copy for yourself. Claims that “the computer lost it” will not be accepted as an excuse.

In addition: this is a professional degree program. As such, students are expected to deal with each other and with their instructors in a collegial manner. That means you should immediately talk to your instructor if you have any concerns about the course, grading, fellow students, the length of time it takes to get back graded assignments, etc.

And, for purposes of this class, you are a bona fide member of the working press. You should expect to be treated with all of the normal courtesies and privileges afforded to the news media. In return, you are expected to represent the profession in a dignified and appropriate manner. If you do not take yourself seriously, be advised that no one else will.
